

MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

All the readings for the Second Sunday of Advent have a hint of the past, while at the same time they are looking to the future. Advent is a time when we should also be looking over our past, while preparing for the future — the future of the coming of the Christ Child at Christmas. This should be a time of great joy in anticipation of this special event; while at the same time, we should be considering how well prepared we are in a spiritual way. What will be our spiritual gift to the Christ Child at Christmas?

In the First Reading, from the Book of Baruch (5:1-9), the writer, a companion of the Prophet Jeremiah during the Babylonian Exile, is exhorting the Jewish people to not be so gloomy; to get up and be joyful for their exile is about to come to an end. In doing so, he is preparing his people for the coming of something great — the coming of God's personal emissary to govern His people. Could the last line be a faint reference to the wise men being guided by the star: "For God is leading Israel in joy by the light of His glory"?

The Responsorial Psalm is (126:1-6). This is a song of the Jewish people as they reflect upon their ancestors, the exiles returning from fifty years of captivity. They recall how they were driven out of Israel by their captors in tears; but upon returning, their joy knew no bounds and they give praise to God for their good fortune.

The Second Reading is from St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians (1:4-6, 8-11). Paul is addressing the Philippians, who were Greek converts to Christianity, and took to Christianity whole heartedly. Paul is urging them to continue on with how they started, even to the end. This last phrase is a veiled reference to the second coming of Christ, which at that time was thought to be soon. Today, we can take that as Paul's encouraging us to be prepared for the coming of Christ at Christmas.

The Gospel Reading is taken from the Gospel of Luke (3:1-6). Much like the First Reading, Luke's Gospel begins with marking a specific historical time period; but its main point is the preaching and message of John the Baptist, which is a quotation from the Prophet Isaiah about clearing a path for the king.

At the time of Isaiah, when a king would go out to visit his subjects, he would send slaves and servants ahead to make sure the roads were cleared of any obstacle that might prevent his safe and comfortable passage. John the Baptist uses this command to his people and to us to do the same in a spiritual sense; that is, to clear any obstacle or sin from our spiritual life so that the King of Kings can come into our hearts and homes at Christmas. "Are you preparing your spiritual life, your heart and soul, to receive the King of Kings?"

Something to think about during your prayer time this week.






Feast of the Immaculate Conception: Dec. 9th - Blessed be her Holy & Immaculate Conception


PRO-LIFE THOUGHT OF THE WEEK FROM PROLIFECORNER.COM
